ANNE FARMER

It is with great sadness that we have to report that local artist Anne Farmer died on 29 August, little more than a month away from her 80th birthday. To mark Anne's passing the Moorlinch

bellringers tolled the tenor bell 79 times and friends and family lit a candle in her memory on Friday 6 September.

Since February 2006 Anne has supplied the MOMSS magazine with pictures and drawings



for its covers. Both Anne and her artwork will also be familiar to visitors to Moorlinch Vineyard, both as a working vineyard and subsequently as Anne's venue during Somerset Arts Weeks. Anne enthusiastically and skilfully recorded the world around her:

"Boats and barns, sheep and shoes, flowers and feathers...(plus artistry and alliteration, obviously)...you will see I paint what takes my fancy! I love the verve and light of watercolours and I try to show the variety of things you can do with them".

In recent years she was also inspired by her dog, Petra, a lively and naughty black Labrador who erupted onto the scene after the death of Anne's dearly missed husband Peter, Petra's almost-namesake, at the beginning of 2020.

MOMSS magazine would like to express their sadness at her death, and their gratitude at her generosity in her tireless supply of images for publication. She will be greatly missed by us all: friends, family and readers.

SKY AT NIGHT Sky Diary October 2024

Sunrise Sunset

Beginning of October 7.13am-6.49pm

End of October 7.03am-4.47pm

Moon Phases

New Moon 2nd / First Quarter 10th / Full Moon 17th / Last Quarter 24th **Planets**

Venus although bright is difficult to see as it sits low in the west as the sun goes down before setting at 7pm because of the bright evening twilight. Saturn is visible all evening into the early hours when it sets at 3.30am. Jupiter rises at 8.30pm and is a splendid bright object, which along with Mars appearing at 11pm means we have good views of the planets before midnight.

Constellation

The sky looking south at this time of year is full of watery constellations! Looking here at around 11.30pm we have left to right the constellations of Eridanus (a river), Cetus (the monster whale), Pisces (two fish), Aquarius (the water carrier), Capricornus (the sea goat) and above these we have Delphinus (the dolphin) and below Pisces Austrinus (the southern fish). Get your fishing net ready (binoculars)

and see what you can catch in this interesting area of sky.

Phenomena

The biggest and brightest super moon rises just after 6pm on Thursday 17th and on the morning of Sunday 27th our clocks go back one hour at 2am as British Summer Time (BST) ends and we revert to Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. October is the month for drilling cereals. Also, the maize harvest will be underway. Farms can be 'ring fenced' which means that public roads do not need to be used to get from field to field. In our case, we use public roads all the time and this also is quite common. Generally, we do not have roads with hedges on banks as is common in Devon but there are single track roads. Consideration is the key and being able to



reverse your car. It is difficult to reverse a tractor and silage trailer on the highway even if one has a camera on the rear of the trailer. We do not have this although we have fitted one to our combine as it is a long and wide vehicle. **Vegans.** "Going vegan could be really bad for your health" wrote David Cox in a Sunday Telegraph article dated 8 September. He quoted a lot a Dr Geoff Mullan, who has an internet presence. A vegan diet is considered good for weight loss and heart health as well as being better for the planet. The latter this writer has considered debatable in previous diaries. As regards health, it is known that babies and the very young should not be on a vegan diet although this was not in his article. The article examined Dr Mullan's thoughts on six key nutrients you can't get easily from plants: vitamin B12, calcium,



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DHA (an omega 3), iron, zinc, selenium. Some of these are not available from plants and some nutrients such as zinc and calcium are more difficult to absorb from a plant-based diet. Before changing to a vegan diet, this author suggests a lot of reading from practitioners who have credentials. This author thinks of meat and dairy as being nutrient dense and what the body is used to having.

Fleeces. A fashion guru said the other day that with clothes getting cheaper we have been buying a lot more of them. As most are from man-made materials, this does not seem wise from an environmental point of view. As mentioned before, sheep are shorn once a year and their fleeces have little market value. We are starting to use them as a weed suppressant around newly planted trees. They will also retain moisture and keep the soil warm. All these conditions should make our trees grow well. They will have done their job if they last two years. The tree in this tube was planted in the early spring and has green leaves although it has not been watered by hand.

MIDDLEZOY ARCHEOLOGICAL EXCAVATION

Context One Heritage and Archaeology have been excavating a Bronze Age site at Back Lane, Middlezoy. The site was first spotted as a ditched enclosure on an aerial photograph. In 2019, geophysical survey took place within the west side of the enclosure, followed by narrow exploratory trenches. This suggested a Late Bronze Age date along with a Romano-British field system and medieval quarry pits.

The current excavation is helping us understand what our Bronze Age ancestors were up to but not everything is as it seems ...

Most of the pottery is Middle Bronze Age, pushing the site back to 3,500 years ago. The enclosure ditches vary considerably in size, the largest being 3m wide and 2.4m deep,

while others are much smaller. We know that feasting was taking place; one ditch contained a whole cow buried with a cooking vessel and hearth debris. Other objects include a quern for grinding grain, a bronze bracelet, and tools for textile and metal working. People were living here, but where?

The answer came over the volunteer weekend held on 13-15 September when we carried out geophysical survey in the east side of the enclosure. In true Time Team style, we discovered a 16-17m diameter circular ring. Just the right size for a very large Bronze Age roundhouse! We can now interpret the site as a Bronze Age farmstead for a large family group. A ditch that divides the site may have separated the 'farmyard' from the domestic area and the varying ditch sizes might relate to where animals needed to be kept in or out.

As if that wasn't enough, we have also found flint tools dating to the Neolithic. It's been great getting to know villagers during the Friday tea-break tours, volunteer digging, and open afternoon. Thank you for your support! *Cheryl Green*


The Committee would like to say a big thank you to Nigel and Cherry for the planting up of the flower pots outside the Hall.

OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP

The Whalebone Theatre by Joanna Quinn

Joanna Quinn was born in London in 1976. When she was 7 she moved with her mother and sister to Dorset. Joanna wrote stories as a child and

her first published work was one inspired by Dorset – a story called *Kestrel* that won a WH Smith Young Writers Award when she was 12.

The Whalebone Theatre, a first novel, is the story of an old English manor house by the sea, with crumbling chimneys, draping ivy and a library full of dusty hardbacks. It's the story of the three children who grow up there, and the adventures they create for themselves while the grown-ups entertain endless party guests; the worlds they imagine from books they aren't supposed to read and the lessons they learn from eavesdropping through oak-panelled doors. But far away from the big house, as the children grow to adulthood another story has been unfolding in the wings and when the war finally takes centre stage, the siblings find themselves cast, unrehearsed into roles they never expected to play.

Most of the attending members liked the book very much with one member saying she loved, loved, loved it. The one dissenting voice felt that there were some characters who we only got a glimpse of and wanted Quinn to expand and explore the issues raised such as homophobia and class prejudice which were never articulated, however, I would certainly recommend this book to fellow readers. BISHOP'S LETTER A LIGHT WHICH SHINES IN THE DARKNESS

The custodial sentences imposed on many of those involved in the recent riots in communities across our country have highlighted, yet again, the issue of criminal justice and the pressures and strains within the prison system. The seemingly ever-increasing size of the prison population; the appalling conditions within many of our older prisons, especially those in our inner cities; the almost total lack of provision

for education and rehabilitation and an apparent unwillingness by those elected to Parliament to consider whether the whole of our justice system needs a radical overhaul have all resulted in much media comment.

But one part of the prison system which has not been mentioned is the invaluable role played by those who serve as chaplains. Prison and restorative justice have been a constant thread almost throughout the whole of my life beginning with my first visit while still in my teens to what was then called a Borstal.

Since then, I've had the privilege of working with chaplaincy teams across the whole of the prison estate. I've witnessed at first hand the extraordinary work done by those teams, lay and ordained, of all faiths, working together to witness to God's love in Christ and caring for all those in the prison system, both staff and prisoners. I've often said to those on the outside, if you want to know what true collaborative ministry looks like in practice, look no further than a chaplaincy team. While each member remains true to his or her particular faith, the barriers which often divide people of faith have no part in that shared work of witness and service.

Sadly, all too often, the work of chaplaincies not just in prison but in all aspects of our human life, in education, hospital, mental health, care homes and many other places, is barely known – that is, until we need their care. But chaplaincies are the yeast which leaven our society. The light which shines in the darkness. Society, as we long and pray for it to be, would be the poorer without them.
