## GENERAL ITEMS

#### SKY AT NIGHT March 2025

**Sunrise Sunset** 

Beginning of March 6.54am-5.53pm End of March 6.47-7.43pm

#### **Moon Phases**

First Quarter 6th / Full Moon 14th / Last Quarter 22nd / New Moon 29th

**Planets** Venus continues as a bright object in the south west at sunset setting at 9pm. It then passes between the Earth and the Sun reappearing as a morning star low in the east before dawn at the end of the month. Jupiter is still on view setting at 1.30am while Mars may be observed until 4.30am.

#### Constellation

Ursa Major the Great Bear is high overhead this month and looks upside down from its usual perspective as it rotates around the North Celestial Pole.

Not many people know that if you would like to find the Pole Star (Polaris) this constellation can help you find it! Take a line bottom to top from the two stars Merak and Dubhe at the front of the constellation, keep going and the next bright star you see is the Pole Star. It is not as bright as many people imagine and although it's also known as the North Star it isn't exactly at the North Celestial Pole.

The Pole Star is the star at the tail end of the Constellation Ursa Minor the Little Bear.

#### **Phenomena**

A busy month starting with a total eclipse of the Moon on the morning of the 14th: unfortunately full eclipse starts at 6.30am just as it sets. On the 20th we have the Spring Equinox when day and night are of equal length then on the 29th there is a partial eclipse of the Sun with mid eclipse at around 11am.

#### WARNING!

Never look at the Sun with the naked eye as it will blind you. Only use

#### proper equipment or at least look through certified eclipse glasses.

#### **FARM DIARY**

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. It is still too wet for much here except sheep grazing. They are called the golden hoof as they tend to enhance pastures. The ultimate enhancement of pasture is a reseed that might include ploughing but that is not always an option and anyway is expensive. Reseeding is also expensive. Ploughing is not an option for example on much loved hilly areas such as parts of the Lake District, Dartmoor and Exmoor. Sheep do the job nearly as well. The goats, that are unlike any other farm animal, are on the way out here partly as they are so inquisitive and so obstreperous that it makes them difficult to handle. They need handling when we vaccinate them, weigh them to check progress and move them amongst other standard management matters. Goats tend to respect our electric fences as do the sheep. Most of us local farmers have lost at least one electric fencing unit to light fingered intruders.

**BNG.** Shades of BFG although this is not a friendly giant but Biodiversity Net Gain. What worries this author about our politicians is that none of them in power appear ever to have run a business. It is business that creates wealth and money for those things we want such as the NHS and good roads. According to a Farmers Weekly article on 14 February by Suzie Horne, BNG requires developers in England to deliver a measurable 10% impact on the biodiversity associated with their sites. This became law in February of last year with small sites added in April of last year and nationally significant infrastructure projects included from, it is thought, the autumn of this year. The gain can be done off site. One simple way is for arable land to be turned into grass

land. This can be an income stream of 30 years or so for farmers. In this author's article on 'muddles' last month, he omitted to mention the big one of the ever-increasing numbers of us who live in this country. At 60% food self-sufficiency in this country and BNG and the muddles highlighted, we are making ourselves more vulnerable to global shocks that are inherently unpredictable.

#### **UPDATE FROM TESSA MUNT, MP**

Thank you to MOMSS Magazine for the opportunity to share some of my work as the MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton.

In January, I supported both the Climate and Nature (CAN) Bill, which sets ambitious UK climate and nature targets and the New Homes (Solar Generation) Bill, which sets a standard for all new homes to be built with solar panels, something I've long believed in. I've spoken in support of the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme, which enables churches and chapels to reclaim VAT on building works. With places of worship also providing cultural landmarks in our communities, I was delighted that the scheme has been continued for another year.

As a long standing campaigner for Radiotherapy machines I was

As a long-standing campaigner for Radiotherapy machines, I was fortunate to host Bryan Robson with Radiotherapy UK on World Cancer Day. Radiotherapy is more precise, effective and far less expensive than cancer drugs. I'm pressing Government to ensure our NHS has the best, most up-to-date machines.

I've also signed a Motion celebrating our annual Wassailing tradition, asking Government to strengthen support for Somerset's cider-producing orchards and ensuring fair prices throughout the supply chain.

## GREINTON VILLAGE NEWS

#### CHURCH and PCC

We are making slow progress in determining the long-term future of the church. The church architect has visited to assess the material condition of the church, and we have a visit from the Deputy Area Dean planned in the next few weeks. We are hoping to hold another village meeting to discuss progress after Easter.

Alongside this, we are due to renew the Electoral Roll for the church, a process which happens every 6 years. This is nothing to do with your right to vote in local or Parliamentary elections but the Church of England's way of recording its membership. It is a way to welcome those new to church life, or to the community, and is a practical symbol of commitment to the church, enabling us to take part in decisions which affect the church and parish, to take part in the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM), and to stand for the Parochial Church Council. #### **PARISH MEETING**

If you saw last month's edition of MOMSS, you will know a parish meeting was held to discuss what level of precept the parish should levy as part of next year's council tax. This will be used primarily to try to reduce both the frequency and volume of rainwater collecting on the roads through the village. We have successfully applied for some grant funding, but need to demonstrate our own commitment as well. As a result of a vote, next year's council tax bill will include a parish element of between about £23 for a Band A home and about £69 for a Band H home, so less than £1 a week for all but the most highly rated homes. This will be reviewed for the following year but may become a regular feature that will give us more flexibility and choices to better support our community. In the meantime, work continues to clear and improve drainage channels through the village. We have also received grant funding from Somerset Prepared to buy a drain camera so we can check the condition of drains ourselves.

A condition of the grant is that we agree to lend the camera to any neighbouring parishes that may have a similar need. If you would like to borrow it, please contact Sam Hearn: greintonparish@gmail.com

#### **OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP**

Despite the roadworks on the A361 through Othery, we had 95% attendance at our meeting with members enjoying a detailed discussion of *A Mad Woman Ball* by Victoria Mas, a first novel published in 2019.



The book is set in the Salpêtrière asylum Paris in 1885, initially built to house the homeless, prostitutes and other undesirables locked away and left to rot, in the 19th century. Dr Charcot took charge and changed it into a teaching and containment hospital. Behind the walls of Salpêtrière, lay grief, trauma and the corrupt powers of the patriarchy. Paris is enthralled by Dr Charcot, his displays of hypnotism of women who have been deemed mad or hysterical .The truth is much more complicated. The inpatients

are women often inconvenient, unwanted wives or strong willed daughters. Once a year a ball is held, the Mad Women's Ball, for the Parisian elite. That night seals the fate of many of the characters in a surprising twist. Genevieve, a senior nurse, meets a new patient, Eugenie, the daughter of a bourgeois family. Genevieve saw Dr Charcot as God and attended to his patients as he required. Eugenie changed all that.

The treatment, containment and control of the women is shocking and cruel. No one could say they enjoyed the book as the story was not enjoyable but it was gripping and hard to put down. The story covered spiritualism, feminism, loyalty and the power of men.

Overall the book was well received, well written and very readable - some members reading it twice to absorb the details. The in-depth discussion recognised how society today still struggles with mental illness and how to treat patients, maintain safety and

control yet try and release patients back into the community.

As well as naming what we're seeing, Lent has its meaning within the life of the Church. Its season of 40 days is a time of preparation for the coming of Easter, our annual celebration of Jesus rising from the dead. It reflects the 40 days that Jesus was tempted in the wilderness after his baptism. So, for much of Christian history it's been a time of prayer and fasting - the origin of our 'giving something up for Lent'.

Lent developed from the practice of the early Church. Back then, as still happens today, converts entered into the faith through baptism. The main time baptism took place was Easter Eve, the night before Easter Sunday. Lent marked the final, intensive 40 days of preparation experienced by those to be baptised (known as catechumens) in readiness for their embarking fully on their new life with Christ.

The time to get ready for Lent is now. This year its first day, Ash Wednesday, falls on 5 March. There's so much we can do to bring this season home into our hearts. Why not join your church's Lent Group? Read one of the Lent books available at this time of year? Take something up? Commit to a regular time of prayer? Find out about getting confirmed? Lent is a rich gift to us to go deeper into our Christian life. As the days lengthen and the light comes, I encourage you to use this time to open yourself afresh to the one who comes to us afresh with new life at Easter - the risen Lord, Jesus Christ himself.
