WHAT A JOY!


GENERAL INTEREST ITEMS

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the field. Every month in the summer is a harvest month. The end of July marks the start of the arable harvest with winter oil seed rape and winter barley. Winter wheat does not follow until August. Here in central Somerset and in the rain shadow of the Quantocks, we are an early-to-harvest area. The combine harvester has just had its pre-season pressure wash. Its final service is next. Grass is also harvested in most

months, whether as hay or silage. The latter is quicker to make and thus less weather dependent and made in plastic film. Readers might like to know our sheep were shorn of their fleece last month (removing their winter coat) and the value of 87 fleeces was about £30 if it was delivered about 30 miles away. The cost of the shearing was greater than this. If Extinction Rebellion members would wear woollen jumpers instead of man-made ones which come from petroleum, we would all be better off. Apples. This has been mentioned before but the old publicity slogan "an apple a day keeps the doctor away" appears to stand up to scientific scrutiny. Sarah Knapton, the science editor of the Daily Telegraph, wrote on 24 May about a 12 year study at the Harvard Medical school. It followed 1,701 over 65-year-olds and looked at their risk of becoming frail. Higher flavanol intake is known to prevent frailty. They are presently found in a lot of fruit and leafy vegetables. The



flavanol quercetin present in apples to a higher degree appears to have the strongest effect. There is mounting evidence that quercetin has many benefits. Wageningen University in the Netherlands has found that one apple a day reduces the risk of strokes by between 36% and 45%. A study by the University of Reading found two apples a day lowered levels of bad cholesterol in the body by 4%. On a separate note, it is the author's thought that our supermarkets are discouraging apple eating. They will stock Gala and Braeburn. The author cannot eat a whole one of these on their own. Whereas with a Cox, he can although they are not often stocked.



SKY AT NIGHT - July 2023

Sunrise Sunset: Beginning of July 5.02am-9.30pm End of July 5.36am-9.00pm **Moon Phases:** Full 3rd / Last Quarter 10th / New Moon 17th / first Quarter 25th **Planets:** Venus is at its brightest at the beginning of the month but disappears into the sun's glow by the month's end, Mars sets at 11pm at which time Saturn rises in the east followed by Jupiter at 1am.

Constellation

The sky is never properly dark at this time of year for stargazing or locating constellations as the Sun is never low enough below the northern horizon for proper darkness but you can try and see noctilucent (night shining) clouds that appear about 90 minutes after sunset in the north west or the same time before sunrise in the north east. These ghostly clouds are so high in the sky that they are illuminated by the Sun while the observer is still in near darkness.



Phenomena:

The first Supermoon of the year is on 3 July when the Moon should appear bigger and brighter than usual.

OTHERY READING GROUP

How to Kidnap the Rich by Rahul Raina

A reliable blackmail formula mixed with the unpredictability of life in this satirical thriller that shrewdly and riotously dissects the huge inequalities of Indian society.



"If you're fat and Indian, you're rich; if you're fat and poor, you're lying. It's only the West where the rich are thin and vegan and moral ..."

The narrator in the novel, Ramesh Kumar grew up deprived and unloved, working on his father's tea stall in the Old City of Delhi. Now, brilliant but poor, he makes a lucrative living taking exams for the sons of India's elite. When one of his clients, the sweet but hapless eighteen-year-old Rudi Saxena places first in the All Indias, the

national university entrance exams. Ramesh sees an unmissable opportunity. Cashing in on Rudi's newfound celebrity, all goes well for both boys for a while. But Rudi's role on a game show leads to unexpected love, blackmail and, finally, a dangerous kidnapping. As Ramesh leads Rudi through a maze of crimes both large and

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small, their dizzying journey reveals an India in all its complexity, beauty, and squalor, moving from the bottom rungs to the circles inhabited by the ultra-rich and everywhere in between.

This was a book that neither gained euphoric praise nor damning condemnation. Some were taken by the witty one-liners and were reminded of their own Indian experiences.

However true to form opinion was divided: "...I read the first two sentences and was hooked" to "....I really struggled with the first half of the book....".

For some the cynicism was uncomfortable and the writing indifferent while others celebrated a rollicking good read. The book we are currently reading is *Foster* by Claire Keegan.

At church services, Pat frequently accepted the request to read the Gospel, Epistle or prayers and on one memorable occasion read the part of Second Irritable Fly in our dramatised reading entitled A Fly's Eye View of the Feeding of the 5,000.

Pat was also an enthusiastic contributor to our Breakfast Cafés and relished the opportunity to engage in conversation with his fellow 'diners'. In March, we held a special Birthday Breakfast Café for Pat's 90th – bacon butties and chocolate cake being referred to as fusion food I believe.

Towards the end of last year, following a short stay in hospital, Pat's daughter Caroline brought her father to a Breakfast Café. Moments before we were about to take on that morning's activity, I asked Pat how he was feeling – expecting to hear a response along the lines of "I'm fine but...".

In fact, the conversation went like this:

Me: "How are you feeling, Pat?" Pat: "Happy."

I have recounted this story many times since and was delighted to hear that someone else who was asked the same question gave the same response as Pat.

Pat was someone who counted his blessings and we have been blessed to have had him as a member of our church family.

Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and friends.



olive oil for greasing and plain (or spelt) flour for dusting 300 g good-quality dark chocolate 250 g raw beetroot 4 large free-range eggs 150 g golden caster sugar

120 g ground almonds

I teaspoon baking powder

I tablespoon cocoa powder 20cm Springform cake tin

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/170°C fan.
- 2. Lightly grease the bottom and sides of the cake tin with olive oil. Line the base with greaseproof paper. Dust the sides of the tin lightly with flour, then tap the tin to get rid of any excess.
- 3. Melt 200gm of the chocolate in the microwave or over a pan of simmering water.
- 4. Peel and grate the beetroot then tip into a large mixing bowl.
- 5. Separate the eggs, placing the whites into a large clean mixing bowl and adding the yolks to the beetroot.
- 6. Stir the sugar, almonds, baking powder, cocoa powder and melted chocolate into the beetroot and mix together well.
- 7. Whisk the egg whites until you have stiff peaks.
- 8. Use a spatula to fold a quarter of the egg whites into the beetroot mixture to loosen, then once combined, fold in the rest but try not to over-mix.
- 9. Add the mixture to the prepared cake tin and spread out evenly using a spatula.
- 10. Bake for around 50 minutes, or until risen and cooked through. Check if it's done with a skewer if it comes out a bit sticky, then give it a bit longer.
- 11. Allow the cake to cool slightly, then carefully turn it out on to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 12. Melt the remaining chocolate then decorate the top with drizzles of the melted chocolate.
