

### **SKY AT NIGHT**

Sky Diary September 2024

#### Sunrise, Sunset

Beginning of September 6.26am-7.55pm

End of September 7.12am-6.50pm

### Moon Phases

New Moon 3rd / First Quarter 11th / Full Moon 18th / Last Quarter 24th

#### Planets

Venus is still low in the west at sunset and sets around 8pm, Jupiter and Mars both appear in the east before midnight while Saturn is at opposition on the 8th being opposite the sun at midnight and visible all night long.

#### Constellation

The Great Square of Pegasus is prominent due south now and is a useful constellation in two ways. First how many stars can you see within the square? The greater number of

stars seen shows a good dark sky level but unfortunately the fewer stars seen reflects a bad level of light pollution which is a growing problem locally. The second is more fun because the top left star which belongs to the neighbouring constellation of Andromeda points the way to the Andromeda Galaxy, the light of which takes over 2.5 million years to reach us.

#### Phenomena

The first super moon of 2024 is on Wednesday 18 September when there is also a partial lunar eclipse but at only 8% obscured will be hardly noticeable.

### **FARM DIARY**

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. September is often a drier month than August which happens to be our third wettest month of the year and when we harvest cereals and other combinable crops. Also, we have learnt through bitter experience that oil seed rape is best drilled in August to catch this rain. The author is referring to central Somerset. A lot of farmers start drilling wheat in September in order to manage all their acreage. We delay this till October. There are several reasons for this but perhaps the main one is to frustrate black grass germination which tails off later in the year. Black grass is one of cereal growers' chief problems as it produces so many seeds and has a wide germination window. It probably also has the ability to leach chemicals into the soil to restrict competition from other plants. We have let it get ahead of us in the past and lost between a half and two thirds of the wheat crop. This means we made a loss on those acres. September is the month for ploughing (when employed) and cultivations. For black grass, false seedbeds are used. That is, the ground is lightly cultivated to encourage the germination of the black grass which is then destroyed prior to the cereal being drilled.

**Dairy.** According to Ro Collingborn, as reported in the Western Daily Press of 20th July, dairy is good for us. The Prospective Urban Rural Epidemiology Study (PURE) took place in 22 countries over nine years following over 136,000 individuals aged 35 - 70 looking at mortality and heart health. Developed and developing countries, rich and poor were in the study which was completed in 2018. The results were conclusive. Dairy consumption was

not associated with higher likelihood of cardio-vascular disease, strokes or mortality. It showed that dairy consumption did not raise total or bad (LDL) cholesterol. Dairy consumption was associated with a lower risk of type 2 diabetes. Dairy protein is high quality and easily absorbed. It reduces inflammation. Dairy is nutrient rich. Dairy in the study considered milk, cheese and yoghurt. The American Food and Drug Administration has allowed a qualified health claim for yoghurt to be put on their pots that "eating at least three servings a week" may reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes. This Farm Diary author is biased. Flowers. One of the Sustainable Farm Incentive (SFI) options is a herbal ley. Using a certain mix of plants, including herbs and grasses, attracts government support and the output of the field can be used - cut or grazed. Our field that has been much admired had a variety of plants in it including phacelia, buck wheat,

The phacelia has been flowering with a purple flower and is covered in bees. We are using this option instead of field beans in our five year crop rotation. Whilst the latter is a good cereal break crop, it does not consistently produce a financial return. *Richard Graham*

#### HOLY CROSS CHURCH Bells

An investigation of the bells and support system in the tower at Holy Cross has recently been undertaken by John Taylor and Sons, one of major bell foundry companies in the UK.

The conclusion of the investigation was that the headstocks on the tenor bell and the Nr 5 should be replaced and that the structural support system should be reinforced.

The PCC sought advice from John Hallett, the Diocesan Bell Tower Advisor, and at their meeting in August agreed to proceed with the remedial work. The estimated cost is  $\pounds$ 35,000 (excluding VAT). The process of raising the funds by fund raising events and grants and obtaining the faculty from the Diocese will now commence.

The bells will continue to be pealed for practice and services. Quarter peals will be restricted and no long peals will be permitted.

### **OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP**

The group recently discussed We were the Mulvaneys, an international bestseller, by Joyce Carol Oats.

The Mulvaneys are seemingly blessed by all that makes life sweet. The perfect American family living the perfect life on High Point farm, just outside Mt. Ephraim, New York. They are respected and liked by everyone. But something happens on Valentine's Day, 1976. An incident involving the pretty sixteen year old daughter, Marianne Mulvaney, destroys the family and is hushed up in the town. This is never discussed within the family. The consequences which follow are tragic. It is the story of the rise, fall and ultimate redemption of an American family.

We were the Mulvaneys illustrates society's unjust and hypocritical view of often laying the blame on the victim of this type of crime rather than the perpetrator.

The group had a lively discussion with everyone contributing their opinions . Nearly all said that they cared about the characters as they struggled in their individual and imperfect ways to comprehend the situation they found themselves in. Most felt that generally there



was too much description and unnecessary detail throughout the book which diverted attention away from the story and which was unnecessary. ### **BISHOP'S LETTER**

### **Reimaging generosity**



In John's Gospel, the first of the signs that Jesus offers to show who he is happens at a wedding in the town of Cana in Galilee (John 2: I-II). Jesus saves the whole event from being a social disaster. The presenting issue is that the wine runs out. This exposes the families that have organised the event to the possibility of severe embarrassment. Rather than modelling lavish hospitality, they are in danger of showing themselves to be stingy and disorganised. Thankfully Jesus's mum is alerted to the situation and gets Jesus on the case. He comes up with a solution and all is well.

What gets me every time about this story is the scale and the quality of the solution that Jesus presents. If my calculations are right, Jesus saves the day by creating the equivalent of six wheelie bins full of wine. And not just your supermarket bottom shelf stuff. The wine he provides is of the very best quality – stuff that would delight sommeliers and wine snobs the world over.

In his first action, Jesus could have chosen to show any number of things about himself – his wisdom, his power, his goodness or so on. What's striking is that he begins by revealing that he is someone of astonishing and abundant generosity. This is at heart who Jesus is. If this is who Jesus is, then that means that this is who God is too. For "in God there is no unChristlikeness". In his first action, Jesus is showing us that at heart, God is abundantly and astonishingly generous.

If we're all made in God's image, might that be at heart who we're called to be too? Often, the call to be generous can be portrayed as hard and difficult, about self-sacrifice and denial, of the costly call to put others first. But what if we reimagined what being generous means? If we understood being generous as in fact the way to reveal and enjoy our true selves – lavishly, abundantly, joyfully... merrily?

### Digital giving on a roll

Churches across Bath and Wells are already starting to reap the reward of the Church of England's Digital Giving Roll-out, having raised over £51,000 between them since November 2023, when 79 parishes were supported to access a discounted contactless unit. Holy Trinity Church, Binegar, overcame its uncertainty about going contactless and have raised nearly £500 on their device, while the rural parish of Lyng has raised over £800 it might not otherwise have received.

### Lottery boost for Porlock church

St Dubricius Church in Porlock has been awarded a £179,335 grant by The National

Lottery Heritage Fund to conserve its spire and roof.

Reverend Ann said: "The church has been at the centre of village life for centuries and is a beacon for both visitors to the village and residents. The last re-shingling was done by village craftsmen using timber from just up the combe. We intend to replicate that as far as is practical, and also to use the project to promote the local heritage, not only of our church building, but of the wider community."

# September is CATCH THE BUS MONTH.

Also in Somerset, September is one of the only two opportunities in the year that bus companies can change their bus timetable. So, bus operators have been looking at their schedules, checking their passenger numbers and some will be making changes from 1 st September to optimise their returns.

So, if you can go online, do check your local bus routes to see what your bus times are from 1st September. The best way of doing this is to go to www.bustimes.org, put in the number of your local bus route and bus times for your local stop will appear. Somerset Bus Partnership has also listed all the bus services which will change in September including a link to the new timetables: https://www.somersetbuspartnership.co.uk/busservices Given the financial emergency declared by Somerset Council, Somerset hasn't the money to increase its funding of buses so the best way of ensuring you keep your local buses is to BUS IT whenever you can... especially this month as it's Catch the Bus Month! By supporting your local bus services whenever you can, you're playing your part in ensuring there are buses for those in your local community, young and old, who don't drive or don't have access to a car hence are dependent on buses. Transport accounts for 45% of carbon emissions in Somerset, so reduce your environmental impact and travel by bus. It's good for your pocket too as a single bus fare costs just £2 or less and that's guaranteed through to the end of the year.

# **APPLES AND ORCHARDS**

Living in this part of the world we are surrounded by orchards....or we used to be. Over the past 50 years over 50% of our orchards have been lost. Most of the orchards we see around us are cider orchards where you can find apples such as Kingston Black, Dabinet, Yarlington Mill, Tom Putt and Hangdown growing.



In the UK alone we have developed over 2,500

varieties of apples. This means you could eat a different UK variety every day for over 6 years!

Some interesting varieties include:

**Core Blimey** - a highly flavoured cox-like apple, but easier to grow than the popular cox

**Christmas Pippin** – cox-style apple discovered recently from a 'wildling' seed, an apple thrown out of a train onto a railway siding which unlike most other new varieties developed from a pip rather than from grafting

**Bloody Ploughman** – reputedly takes its name from a ploughman who was caught stealing apples and shot by a gamekeeper. His wife got the bag of apples and threw them on the rubbish heap and one of the seedlings that emerged was rescued by a workman and subsequently named.

Winter Banana – an apple that tastes like bananas, seriously – it does! Evidence has shown that apples grew wild in Britain in the Neolithic period .The earliest known mention of apples in England was by King Alfred in about 885 AD in his writings of *Gregory's Pastoral Care*.

The costard is one of our oldest English apple varieties, first mentioned under the name of Poma Costard in the fruiterers bill of Edward I in 1292 at which time it was sold for one shilling (5p) per hundred. It is difficult to find a true costard these days but must have been grown very extensively since the retailers were called costardmongers, now known as costermongers.

### Wassailing

An old cider county tradition, wassailing usually takes place on January 17th - Old Twelfth Night. The idea is to protect the trees from evil spirits and to make sure they produce a plentiful crop in the coming season. The best or oldest tree is chosen to represent them all,

and is known as the Apple Tree Man, which is feted as a guardian of the orchard. Cider is poured on the roots, pieces of toast or cake soaked in cider are placed in the fork of the tree or hung from the branches for the robins (spirits of the trees). The tips of the lower branches are drawn down and dipped into a bucket of cider and the tree is toasted with cider and songs. Then the trees are rapped and a huge din is made to drive away evil spirits and wake the sleeping trees. Buckets are beaten and shot guns fired through the top-most branches. Many believed that if the trees weren't wassailed then there would be no apples.

And best of all this wonderful fruit can be eaten raw, boiled, pureed, put in pies and cakes and baked.

## SOMERSET APPLE CAKE INGREDIENTS

4 ounces butter	6 ounces dark brown sugar
	0 1 1 1 1

2 eggs, beaten

- I teaspoon ground mixed spice
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3-4 tablespoons milk
- I tablespoon light brown sugar

# **METHOD**

Grease and line a deep 7" round cake tin with greaseproof paper.

Cream the butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Add the eggs, a little at a time, beating well after each addition.

Add the flour, spices and baking powder and mix well. Fold in the apples and enough milk to make a soft dropping consistency.

Turn the mixture into the prepared tin and bake at 325F for 1 1/2 hours, until well risen and firm to the touch. Turn out on a wire rack to cool.

When the cake is cold, brush with the honey and sprinkle with the light brown sugar.
