LETTER FROM REV DEBORAH KIRK



ADVENT WAITING

I have read that by the time we are seventy years old, we will have spent three years of our lives just waiting: waiting in the queue to pay for the shopping, waiting in the doctor's surgery, waiting for lunch to be ready, waiting for transport, waiting for news of that job or for your teenager to get in from their party or for the results of those health checks.

In the days before I was a minister, one of my jobs was an administrator in a primary school and as Christmas approached, the children would get more and more excited – filled with anticipation as the last days of term ticked by. And they would come and look at the Nativity laid out in reception, and ask with open-eyed wonder on their faces. 'When will Christmas come?'

Here we are again in the season of Advent waiting. Supposing Christmas Day was tomorrow – would you be ready? Something adults say very wisely which most children think is nonsense is:'

"It is better to travel than to arrive". Meaning that often the looking forward to something is almost better than the 'something' itself.

Whether you think that is true for you or not, it's as if we need these next 4 weeks to work our way through the days like a journey, opening the doors of the Advent calendar, lighting our Advent candles, doing our various preparations, reflecting on the lectionary readings and each day remembering a little bit more about what Christmas means. As we get our homes ready, we get our hearts ready too.

T S Eliot wrote: "the end of all our exploring will be to arrive where we started and know the place for the first time". Advent is an encouragement to take the time to really *journey* through the days, so that when we hear those wonderful words of John's Prologue on Christmas morning - even though we have heard them many times before we will hear them with fresh wonder and joy, as if it is the first time:

" In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.² He was in the beginning with God.³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being ...¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived

among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth".

What about making a little Advent feature for your home - an angel holding the promise - a rough path - a white candle? Every day during Advent, remove a stone as you pray. On



Christmas Day remember the promise fulfilled in Jesus, light the white candle - and the path will be clear!

Faithful God, As this season of Advent begins, Help me to be patient in waiting, trusting that Your Grace is sufficient for me. Help me to be courageous in waiting, Trusting that Your strength will carry me through. Help me to be loving in waiting, Trusting that the love brought down to us at Christmas in Jesus Christ

Is the love that will bring eternal peace into every heart. Amen Peace for the journey, Deborah, Superintendent, Methodist Circuit

SKY AT NIGHT December 2024 January 2025

Sunrise Sunset

Venus which has been slowly moving upwards from its position low in the south-west

after sunset starts to approach maximum brilliance. It sets later as we move from 2024 into 2025, not setting until 8.45pm during January. Saturn which has put on such a good show recently is now not so prominent and sets during the early evening. The planet of the moment is Jupiter shining high and is at its closest to the Earth on 6 December and is at opposition on 7th when it reaches a position opposite the Sun; use a pair of binoculars to spot its four brightest moons. Mars the red planet is the third brightest planet now and is at its closest to the Earth since 2022 on 12 January. Like Jupiter it is visible all night long, look for it close to the full moon on 13 January.

Constellation

During the period over Christmas and into the new year the night sky is dominated by the bright, prominent and unmistakable shape of the stars of the constellation of Orion the Hunter. The most prominent stars in Orion are blood-red Betelgeuse top left which will one day explode as a supernova, Rigel a blue-white extremely hot star located bottom right and the three stars which form Orion's belt which are left



to right Alintak, Alnilam and Mintaka. Below the belt you can see a glowing cloud of gas which is visible to the naked eye and forms Orion's sword. This area is a stellar nursery where new stars are being born and is a fantastic sight with binoculars.

Phenomena

21 December is the day when the Sun reaches its lowest point in the sky as we experience the winter solstice and our shortest day.

On the night of 3-4 January we have the peak of the Quadrantid meteor shower which occasionally produces colourful shooting stars. Paul Adamson 01823698156

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. Two dry weeks in November allowed a lot of catching up with field work. Conditions were not ideal but needs must. In the end, the plough was used to turn up some dry soils; not part of our long-term plan. We waited and waited to drill our winter wheat as we call autumn sown wheat. It involved a lot of head scratching and visits to fields to determine whether conditions allowed drilling. This absorbed a lot of time. With sandy soil, it can rain one day and field work can be done the next but, with soils with some clay content, one can have to wait for some time. If it is possible to make a sausage in one's hand, the soil is too wet for traffic. Whether wheat drilled in the middle of November will yield adequately depends on the winter weather.

Head Winds. The weather is the biggest of these as most farmers are totally dependent on it. Luckily, in the summer we had some rain so that the crops were mediocre. Without this rain they would have been a disaster after the wet cold spring. This autumn, we have already scrapped some oil seed rape that succumbed to slugs and birds. Global markets affect our prices and with the USA election it has become more difficult to predict crop prices. America



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is a major exporter of maize, wheat and soya. Shortly after this election, we sold the remainder of our wheat from the last harvest - apart from a part load of wheat. The government provides head winds as well. The author knows one local farmer who is turning his farm over to solar panels and they will join a neighbour's. That is another significant block of land not producing food. Family farms are now in the firing line and the NFU disagrees with the Chancellor as to how many farms it will affect. The NFU leader is saying 75% of the total farmed area will be affected. Presumably that will affect 75% of our food production. This is a long term matter and the chickens will only come home to roost long after these current politicians have left office. It is causing disconsolation in our industry. Family businesses make up 90% of privately owned firms in the UK employing 14 million people according to Melissa Lawford of The Daily Telegraph dated 15 July 2024. Some household names in Somerset will be affected by these changes.

OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP

In November the group discussed *Cuddy* by Benjamin Myers which won the 2023 Goldsmiths Historical Prize and was chosen as book of the year by several newspapers. Cuddy is the affectionate name for St Cuthbert of Lindisfarne who was a monk, bishop and hermit.



A century after his death his remains were removed to prevent desecration by the Danes. After a further two centuries they were eventually interred in Durham, whose cathedral was built in his honour.

The novel is in four sections set centuries apart starting with the group, mainly monks, who accompany his body in their search for a suitable safe resting place for their beloved saint; a tale of a champion archer, his abused wife and her stonemason lover; a 19th century professor hired to oversee one of several exhumations and a young man caring for his mother in present times who finds solace in the cathedral. Connecting threads run through the novel using similar names for characters. The presence of owleyed youths and other characters linking the different eras while employing different styles for each separate book. Durham Cathedral and Cuddy are important figures throughout the novel. Myers is a poet and this shows in his wonderful descriptive prose which is full of his love for the north of England.

Although some found the early part difficult to get into and a few members had yet to finish the novel, most loved the book saying it was "one of the richest reads l've had for a long time", "a book that changed me", "loved it from beginning to end", "language a joy". A work which rewards perseverance.

The group's next book will be discussed at the January meeting.

In November, an open meeting was held to discuss the future of Greinton's parish church. This is the latest in a series of meetings and comes in the wake of discussions with the Archdeacon for Wells and the diocesan church buildings advisor. The good news is that a superficial examination of the church's structure suggests it is in reasonable shape. However, the meeting agreed that a full structural survey is long overdue and should be arranged to check for any major work required. More concerningly, the parish does not currently have sufficient active members of the church to fulfil the roles of a Parochial Church Council (the management committee that runs the church). We are looking into ways to overcome this problem.

On a more positive note, the Act of Remembrance was well attended and we are hoping for a similarly successful Christmas Celebration event, which will take place on the Sunday before Christmas, 22 December, starting at 5pm. This is designed for all the family, regardless of religion, and is a great opportunity to get together with friends and neighbours for some Christmas cheer. As always, we are keen to involve as many people as possible so, if you would like to read a short seasonal poem, or have a song or piece of music you would like to hear, please let Toby Crispin know as soon as possible.

The village hall's autumn Mouse Racing event took place at the Bere Cider Company Barn in November, primarily to offer a larger venue and avoid last year's cramped conditions. It was a great success and a considerable amount was raised for both the Dorset & Somerset Air Ambulance and village hall funds. Many thanks to all involved. By the time you read this, our Christmas Bingo night, which coincides with our monthly pub night on Friday 6 December, will be upon us. Doors open at 6pm. There won't be a pub night in January but there will almost certainly be a New Year's Eve party in the village hall instead. Next pub night will be Friday 7 February.

Work continues to improve the village's resilience to water run-off collecting on the

A361 and causing problems to both local and through traffic. We have received a grant from Somerset Prepared which will be spent on improvements to drainage and equipment to help control and disperse water off the road.

Finally, community carol singing will take place around the village on Friday 20 December. All are welcome to join in – meet outside the church at 4pm. Dress for the weather and bring a torch or lantern. We will finish at West Town Farm with warm drinks and nibbles at about 6pm. Toby Crispin

The churchwardens are the people to contact for arranging baptisms, weddings and funerals during the vacancy of the post of Priest-in-Charge for the United Benefice of MOMSS&G.

COMMON FUND 2025

What our churches are asked to pay to the diocese to cover resources received

The Bath and Wells Diocese cost £15.26m to run in 2024. £11.24m of this came from the parishes in the form of the Parish Share. This does not include the cathedral and its staff and the Bishop's Palace, all of which are funded separately by the Church Commissioners. Approximately three quarters of the cost is the training, salary, pension and housing cost of the clergy. In 2025 a new system is being operated after two consultations in the diocese this year. Under the old system, 30% of parishes in the diocese were financially supporting the remaining 70% which was considered unsustainable and needed to be addressed.

The Common Fund of 2025 will not be parish based but benefice based as clergy are allocated to benefices. The new Benefice Share will be the sum of three parts. Part A, making up roughly 75%, will be the direct ministry cost, in our case as a half time post in vacancy. Part B, about 13%, is a proportion of diocesan wide costs of curates, ordinands, archdeacons and support services, including Flourish House, the diocesan offices in Wells. Part C, about 12% of the whole, is a mutuality and generosity contribution for funding benefices that suffer extreme rural sparsity or deprivation and also could enable new churches. Our benefice will thus be asked for A+B+C or £53,891. This represents a huge increase, however it will be phased in over 5 years. The amount requested from



the benefice for 2025 is £34,573.

At a recent meeting of the wardens and church representatives it was decided to apportion the share between the churches in the benefice according to the number of their regular worshippers, rather than by a more complicated formula suggested by the diocese. So for 2025 the share for Middlezoy is $\pounds 10,517$, for Othery $\pounds 8,413$, Moorlinch $\pounds 5,609$ and for Stawell $\pounds 9,114$. For Greinton a flat rate of $\pounds 920$ was suggested by the diocese. In 2024 the share from our combined churches was $\pounds 29,743$ so this will immediately represent a substantial increase.

The future of our benefice is currently under discussion, but if we are still in vacancy after 18 months the Benefice Share will automatically be reduced.

BISHOP'S LETTER "JESUS, THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD"

THE HOLY THORN

The cutting of the Glastonbury Holy Thorn is a royal tradition that involves sending a sprig of the holy thorn to the monarch for Christmas. It is thought loseph of Arimathea visited Glastonbury with the Holy Grail. He thrust his staff into Wearyall Hill, which then grew into the original thorn tree. Each year a sprig of it is cut by the eldest child at St John's infant school in Glastonbury. This

MUSIC ON THE LEVELS


Music on the Levels reveals its programme for 2025

Many hundreds of years before Jesus was born, God had promised his people that he would send a saviour to our world. This promise was recorded and written down by messengers to whom God revealed the future. The saviour would be called 'Messiah' or 'Christ'; both words mean 'Chosen One'. Part of the promise was that he would be descended from David, Israel's greatest king, and that's exactly what the family tree of Jesus Christ shows. In fact, his ancestors go right back to Abraham himself.

One day, a day just like any other, in Nazareth, a town in Galilee, an angel appeared without warning to a young virgin called Mary, who was engaged to a man named Joseph. The sudden appearance of an angel gave Mary a terrible fright, but the angel said, 'Don't be afraid, Mary. I am Gabriel and I have been sent with a message from God for you. God is pleased with you.'

Mary was badly shaken - what on earth could the angel mean? Gabriel assured her. 'There's no need to worry, Mary. God is pleased with you, and you are going to have a baby boy - you are to give him the name Jesus. He will be a great man and will be known as God's Son.'

'But how?' Mary asked. 'I'm a virgin.' Gabriel explained that God's Holy Spirit would form the baby within her. Gabriel encouraged Mary to believe that nothing is impossible with God. Mary responded with simple, accepting faith. 'I'm honoured to serve God in whatever way he sees fit.'

When Joseph discovered Mary was pregnant, all he could imagine was that she must have been unfaithful to him. But he was a caring man, and did not want to shame her, so he decided to break off their engagement with a minimum of fuss. But an angel told him in a dream that Mary had done nothing wrong. The baby inside her was unique, the only one ever to be formed by God without human intervention. As if that wasn't enough, what was happening to Mary had been described by one of God's messengers, some 800 years beforehand. The angel told Joseph to name the child 'Jesus', meaning 'saviour', because he would make it possible for everyone to be forgiven for all the wrong things they have done. In Jesus, God himself would live among the people of earth.

Some little while later the Roman emperor, Augustus, ordered a census of his entire Empire. This required every man to return to his place of birth to register, along with any family he might have. So Joseph had to journey to Bethlehem, because he was a descendant of king David. Mary, who was heavily pregnant, went with him. And so it was that she gave birth to her firstborn son in Bethlehem. Because of the chaos caused by the census, Mary and Joseph had nowhere to stay except a stable, so Mary wrapped her newborn son up tight, and used a manger for a cot.

After his death, followers of Jesus wrote about the significance of his birth and life: 'Although Jesus was himself God and shared God's nature, he didn't cling to that privilege. Quite the opposite; he was willing to become nothing, a servant, one of us - and even to die for us.'
