

A COMMITMENT TO SERVE



 $D \mid O \subset E \subseteq O \models$ "Your Majesty, as children of the kingdom of God we welcome you in the name of the King of kings". In **Bath**& Wells reply to these opening words at his Coronation, King Charles III responded 'In his name and after his example I come not to be served but to serve.' This

short exchange summed up what the service was about and what it intended to convey. The King's commitment to service is not in any doubt. To give just a few examples, he has engaged with our most challenged communities far more than any politician, he called on us to care for the environment years before it became popular to do so and, of course, founded The Prince's Trust, which supports our most challenged younger people in so many ways.

He becomes king of a new era, the Carolean era. Our times see us face some big challenges. Our question is how to address them. I was immensely struck by all the agencies and charities present in the Abbey for the King's Coronation. Their participation spoke of the ways in which we're going to need to act differently in the years ahead to address the issues that confront us.

Because it's all too evident that the power of government, be that local or national, to respond to the problems we see is less now than it was when the late Queen began her reign. Our challenge in this era is of how we're going to come together, in service, to address the different challenges that lie before us, be that the climate, how we tackle poverty, how we respond to a troubled international situation. All of us will have a part to play.

Where to find the resource to act in the way that's going to be needed? As I stood beside the King at the Coronation what inspired me was to see the way he drew so much strength, purpose and resolve and assurance from his Christian faith for the service he's called to give.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. With the very wet early May weather, spring work is late. More than most industries, farmers are at the mercy of the weather. Early and late spring work will need to be done at the same time. Maize drilling and first cut silage are the jobs done in early May which are late. Silage quality falls as the grass puts up seed heads. Next winter, animals on silage will need more supplementation with 'nuts'. Nuts are purchased feed in pellet form that will include for example: protein, energy, vitamins and minerals and will be tailored towards that in which the main feed is short. The protein and energy can be soya meal, cereals, brewers grains and so on. With late planted maize it has to be borne in mind that the plant breeders have provided us with forage maize that can be grown at this latitude. Already it is a crop that is harvested quite late so that delay in planting could make this

later again or less mature and lower quality. Ground conditions at this time can be challenging. **Bear Grylls.** Having been a vegan before, he now regrets this. It must be possible to be vegan and healthy but as Bear Grylls points out the nutrient density of meat and dairy is immense. Other commentators have pointed out that the elderly, children and those on lower incomes will find it difficult to do well on a vegan diet. The environmental credentials of alternatives to meat and dairy are also suspect. All these points have been made before by this author. **Hunting etc.** Hunting wild animals with dogs was banned some years ago. The debate at the time was based on political considerations rather than scientific ones. Counter-intuitively, foxes have declined catastrophically since the ban. However, we do need to understand if you have more of one thing you tend to have less of another. At the moment, the author is plagued with jackdaws. Their number is increasing relentlessly each year. Something else must be disappearing. The RSPB has been discovered to be killing foxes in Northern Ireland to address the declining number of lapwings which are ground nesting birds. All tricky. *Richard Graham*

MIDDLEZOY & OTHERY SCHOOLS NEWS

It has been a fantastic few weeks at Middlezoy and Othery Schools. The children have, as always, been working hard. Year 6 have been preparing for their assessment week and we have continued to enjoy many additional enrichment activities. Local artist Darrell Wakelam worked

with all our children to make two fantastic pieces to mark the coronation of King Charles. We had a whole school celebratory afternoon tea party to mark the occasion which was organised and run by our amazing PTA. Phoenix Class have enjoyed a trip to the West Somerset Railway to supplement their learning in school about the history of railways. There are many activities and special events coming up as we rapidly move through the Summer Term. As always, the Local Governing Body, Directors and Staff have been considering ways to ensure we can provide the very best provision for all our children. The number of children registered to Middlezoy from September 2023 will be 15. County have confirmed the local demographics data and do not envisage this to change over the next few years due to reduced birth rates across the county. We have therefore made the decision, for an initial trial



*subject to eligibility

period of one academic year, to educate all children on the Othery School site. We truly believe that this decision is in the best interests of the children, staff and the school; bringing advantages for all.

As a small school with three teachers, all the children will benefit from all teachers and support staff being on one site. It will help Subject Leaders in developing a whole school curriculum to support a high level of education for our pupils. It will also take the pressure off staff when it is needed to provide cover for absences and illness.

Othery School building currently fits the needs of all the children regarding learning space, play areas, toilets and has

the added benefit of the hall. We also can foresee that parking space for staff and parents is more accessible and can access the playing field easily. There are more whole school facilities within school including PE space, school hall and the ability to host the whole school in assemblies. The minibus will still run to ensure all

children registered at Middlezoy have transport to school every morning and afternoon.

We held an open meeting to discuss the move to one site for parents and carers, with no concerns or issues raised Positive comments include the benefit for parents to be able to have all siblings on one site easing drop off and pickups, an oversight of an all through curriculum and joint collaborative learning opportunities.



We will be evaluating the single site move regularly as a staff body, in consultation with the LGB.As a whole school too, we look forward to sharing our learning journey. Lindsay Hayward, Headteacher and Nicola Mannion, Chair of Governors

WESTERN FRONT ASSOCIATION (WFA)

Dr Rodney Atwood is a graduate of the McMaster University, Canada and Churchill College, Cambridge. He served in the Royal Tank Regiment before pursuing an academic career. He has written extensively on military history.

At the outbreak of the war Rudyard Kipling was a most popular author, he wrote propaganda pamphlets and stories during the war and some poetry.

His only son John was killed at Loos in 1915 and his body was not found. Kipling spent a large part of his life after this trying to find out what happened to John and ensure that he had a proper burial. Later he worked with the Imperial War Graves Commission

and Commonwealth War Graves Commission, suggesting many of the phrases that we find in CWGC cemeteries to this day.

Everyone is welcome to come to meetings. We ask for a ± 5 donation to help cover costs: this includes a mug of tea or coffee and a raffle ticket. If you wish to bring your own drink this is fine.

The Constellation of Scorpius the Scorpion is another constellation which resembles its name. It sits on the southern horizon and can be recognised by the bright red supergiant star Antares which is known as the rival of Mars. On 3 June the Moon is very close by.

The Summer Solstice when the Sun reaches its most northerly point is on 21 June when we have our shortest night and longest day.

THE WILDING OF MIDDLEZOY

In the autumn of 2020 the concept of a Middlezoy bio-diversity group became an actuality. By the following spring a group was formed, funds raised and a gentle project commenced of increasing awareness about our glorious countryside on the Levels and what each household could do to increase diversity.

The project gained momentum, trees and 'whips' were planted, seeds were raised, existing wild plants were divided and the subsequent offspring moved to new locations.

The group prospered with the excitement of planting, but perhaps withered a little with the necessity of clearing ground and watering saplings. Not everything works! YET not even three years later the results begin to show, individual households make different choices as to what is grown in their garden, lawns are mown less, allowing seeds to develop and produce food for small birds. This is most necessary in May and June when the young are in the nest.

In my own home, the bat maternity unit is full, this demonstrates that insects are increasing. Next door my neighbour has been visited by a hedgehog, the first seen in several years. Perhaps this means that the badgers have been able to find a more varied diet.

The Salt Path by Raynor Winn

In 2013 after a disastrous investment which saw their finances plummet, the author and her husband Moth are evicted by bailiffs. Having lost their farm and almost all their savings they find themselves homeless and with very little money. Added to this Moth has recently been diagnosed with a terminal illness that affects his body as well as his brain. Despite this, Raynor, inspired by the book '500 Miles Walkies' by Mark Wallington, decides that they should walk the South West Coastal Path. The Salt Path is Raynor's account of their journey. It describes how they overcome the difficulties of Moth's illness, wild camping and surviving on very little income. Along the way they meet some very different characters and find an inner strength that allows them to plan for a future. The group had a lively discussion about the choices Raynor and Moth made, some of which irritated many of the members, particularly those who had read it for the second time. We also discussed the court system and the plight of the homeless. However, all agreed that the book was well written, an interesting easy read and thought provoking.
