

BENEFICE. DEANERY AND DIOCESAN ITEMS

RESHAPING THE GLASTONBURY DEANERY THE SHARED LOCAL MINISTRY PLAN

At these difficult times, the Diocese of Bath and Wells is experiencing challenging financial circumstances which mean every deanery is reevaluating how ministry is effectively conducted and how clergy are deployed. This Deanery needs to reduce from 6.5 stipendiary ministers to five by 2027. The aim is to submit a proposal to the Diocese by the end of January 2024 to meet the Diocesan timetable. This is not a 'numbers game' but about trying to find opportunities to do things differently that meet today's context and build for the future. We will also explore the role of lay ministry and how to use people's talents more effectively.

Over the last few months, we have gathered data on parishes and sought opinions from the active congregations. A small working group has been created to discuss the findings in detail. This group is a balance of laity and clergy, rural and urban, larger and smaller benefices to represent the Deanery at large and not to argue for one parish over another or any particular vested interest.

The group will provide the Deanery Synod with options by the end of October, which Synod Representatives will take to PCCs for consideration, with agreement on which one to take forward in December. This option will be developed into a proposal for the Bishop to consider.

This will be challenging. We must all be sensitive to the fact that people's jobs are being discussed as we consider how best to sustain our current congregations and develop God's commission to spread His gospel of salvation. There is no right or satisfactory answer and some hard decisions will be made. What we ask for is your constructive support and prayers as we undertake this work.

The awareness of the world of creation around us - birdsong; the quill of a porcupine on the path; a family of wild pigs running through wheat fields. The kindness and hospitality of strangers. Encountering God in new people



and places.

During this month, when perhaps the business of your life is stilled a little, are you expecting to encounter God? Will he need to break in or interrupt you, or how might you intentionally make time for him? Where might you notice the glimpses of God in the world around and hear his voice speaking into your experience?

I hope that this summer you will experience not only the rest and recreational power of a good holiday but also the space to renew your relationship with God. Along with the writer to the Ephesians, I pray "that you may have the power to comprehend, ...what is the breadth and length and height and depth," of God's love for you.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland. In the Field. The cereal harvest should have begun by the time you read this. It all depends on the weather which at the time of writing was too unsettled to warm up the combine harvester. As it happens harvest for a particular variety of a particular crop is nearly always within three or four days of the same date. This year it looks as if the harvest will be at the early end of this scale. The last week of July is time for the winter sown oil seed rape and the winter sown barley. The first week of August is for winter sown wheat. Winter sown beans are later in August and they turn an eye-catching black before



being ready to harvest when the beans are dry in their pods. The latter are shattered by the combine so that only the bean is collected. Beans make a very good break crop and entry for wheat with the residual nitrogen from their nitrogen fixing property. These dates are for central Somerset.

Baked Beans. More of these are eaten in the UK than in the rest of the world combined. However, we have not been able to grow them. Scientists from the University of Warwick have bred three varieties that just might change this. A farmer in Lincolnshire has planted a commercial scale of these haricot beans. Watch this space.



Diet. As reported in The Daily Telegraph of 7 July by its science correspondent, Joe Pinkstone, we can savour our steak and cheese without it taking a bite out of our life expectancy. This is an important study with the lead author, Dr Andrew Mente, of McMaster University in Canada. This is a ten year study of 150,000 people from 20 countries. Dr Mente concluded that cardiovascular diseases and early mortality may not be the result of over-indulging in meat and dairy but under-nutrition by not eating enough key food groups. These include vegetables, legumes, fruit and fish and nuts. People were 30% less likely to die during the study period when consuming a well-balanced range of foods. There is evidence to suggest that whole-fat dairy may be protective against hypertension and metabolic syndrome - key drivers of cardiovascular disease. *Richard Graham*

SKY AT NIGHT

August 2023

Saturn reaches opposition on the 27th when it is at its closest to Earth for the year and is visible all night long. Jupiter (much brighter) rises at 11pm in the east and Venus reappears as a morning star around 5pm.

Constellation

The three stars which appear as darkness falls are known as the summer triangle, being Deneb, Vega and Altair. If you wait until around I I pm you will see they have the spiral

arm of the Milky Way galaxy running through them. Under a truly dark sky without light pollution this is an amazing sight and through binoculars stars appear too numerous to count.

Phenomena

There are two Super Moons this month on the 1st and 31st the second being the biggest and brightest. On the night of 12th /13th it is the peak of the Perseid meteor shower, one of the best of the year.

OTHERY READING GROUP

Our reading choice for July was Foster by Claire Keegan.

Claire Keegan was born in County Wicklow in 1968, she is the youngest of a large family. She travelled to New Orleans, Louisiana when she was 17 and studied English and Political Science. She returned to Ireland in 1992 and later moved to Wales where she undertook an MA in creative writing and taught undergraduates at the University of Wales, Cardiff.

Claire has won numerous literary awards in Ireland and she is best known for her short stories.

This book, which is described as a novella, is based on events which take place in Ireland during the summer of 1981. The setting is rural County Wexford. The notion of fostering has a long history in Ireland. The old Gaelic chiefs used fostering to create alliances and maintain peace accords with local rival chieftains. It is a hot summer, a pregnant mother waits for yet another mouth to feed. One of her daughters is taken by her indifferent father to live on her aunt and uncle's farm, not knowing when or if she will be brought home again. In the Kinsellas' house she finds an affection and warmth she has not known and slowly in their care she begins to blossom.

Our members mostly enjoyed the book, but some were waiting for something to

happen, the story ended too soon, they wanted to know more. The descriptive writing was enjoyed. Others found the story mundane. This story did however touch members and promoted an interesting discussion on personal experiences and reminiscing. "A vehicle for ones' memories."

There is no Book Group meeting in August, but we meet again in September when our chosen book will be *House by the Thames* by Gillian Tindale.

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
