

# **Moon Phases**


New Moon 1st / First Quarter 9th / Full Moon 15th / Last Quarter 23rd

### **Planets**

Venus, which has been low in the south-west after sunset, becomes brighter and more prominent when it appears higher in a darker sky before setting at 7pm. Saturn is visible all evening looking south setting just after midnight. Jupiter, which reaches opposition in December, rises at 5.30pm - shining brightly before setting at 5.30am. Mars appears at 9pm and is close to the Moon on the 20th.

# Constellation

On the 17th the Moon and Jupiter can be seen in the constellation of Taurus the Bull with Jupiter placed between the horns of the bull and the Moon just above. This V shaped cluster of stars is called the Hyades within which (although not part of) you can see the bright eye of the bull the star Aldebaran, which is reddish/orange in colour. Over to the right the hazy patch of light you can see is the Pleiades or Seven Sister's star cluster which look great in binoculars. The winter constellations are upon us as following Taurus into the early hours we see Orion the Hunter.



### **Phenomena**

The last super moon of the year appears on November 15th: try to catch it as it rises at around 3.45pm. *Paul Adamson 01823698156*

# **FARM DIARY**

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. We have drilled some cereals but with the continued wet weather most is still undrilled. This could have a yield penalty. It all depends on the winter we experience. The oil seed rape which is drilled in August is a disaster with birds and slugs taking it. The goats are inside now but the sheep remain out as they are hardy and used to the conditions. At the time of writing, there is still a lot of maize waiting for drier conditions so that tractors can travel in the fields.

Rewilding. The author has been asked to write about this. The charity Rewilding Britain want 30% of land and seas rewilded. This is fine if you don't need to eat. We are only about 60% self-sufficient at the moment. There is productive land being lost to housing, solar panels and flood defence schemes and in numerous other ways. In Somerset, the topography is such that there are plenty of areas of land that are fairly wild. The Quantocks, the Blackdowns, and the Polden hills all provide wild areas. However, this does not stop pockets of land such as in our gardens or in churchyards being managed differently. The wild life will benefit. In these small areas, it is possible to keep on top of injurious weeds such as ragwort. This is largely fine when growing as livestock will avoid it but when cut or sprayed and dying it becomes palatable but still poisonous. These are of course personal views. Badgers. The BBC seem intent on upsetting farmers. As has been written before, the NFU gave Jeremy Clarkson a prize and recognition after one year of his Clarkson's Farm as he did so much for farming. The BBC's flag ship programme on the subject has been going for 30 years but not had the same impact. Also, the BBC gave Sir Brian May a programme on badgers that had the NFU and the British Cattle Veterinary Association (BCVA) up in arms. As May practised as an astrophysicist and has a PhD, it is surprising he supports a view that is not focused on evidence. The BCVA says that the latest evidence clearly shows that badgers do transmit TB. There is not enough space here to quote the BCVA fully but they reiterate that no one action will solve the TB problem. It is a devastating disease for farmers let alone the animals. Badger culls and a range of other strategies have contributed to the 20 year all time low number of breakdowns of this disease. Richard Graham

# **OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP**THE GHOST SHIP by KATE MOSSE

The book is the third in a series, the next volume *The Map of Bones* was published in October.

Some readers found the book so enthralling that they had obtained the earlier volumes and were waiting for the fourth. Others were not so keen and thought the story far-fetched, especially that of a woman as captain of a pirate vessel, and another woman being

brought up as a man. Both these eventualities - however improbable have historic antecedents. All agreed the book was well written and well researched.

The background is the persecution of the Huguenots in France and the rest of Europe, a series of riots followed by edicts forcing them to flee country after country, only to be followed by an amnesty often in the name of trade, until once again the militant arm of the Catholic Church in the form of the Inquisition won the power struggle. It seems the writer's aim was to humanise these events through revealing the history of a fictional family. The casual cruelty and the horrors of the slave trade are mentioned together with the hypocrisy and arrogance of some religious people on both sides of the ideological divide. The detail of piracy is partly based on the history of Grace O'Malley 1530-1603 a contemporary of Elizabeth I whom she met. She managed to outwit her neighbouring warring



tribes as well as the British Government and the wily Cecil to establish her family against enormous odds. She had two husbands and several children, one of who was born aboard ship. She captained a pirate ship and finally owned/controlled a fleet of pirate ships, whilst convincing the British that she was acting in their interests. She was imprisoned twice and was under sentence of death, yet lived to the age of 73; improbable but true. *Gill Wilkinson*

# **BISHOP'S LETTER**

# "IT TAKES THE WHOLE WORLD TO KNOW CHRIST"

Do you think a fish knows that it's swimming in water? I've been reflecting on this question not because it's some kind of Buddhist koan – the type of question that asks,

"What's the sound of one hand clapping?" Rather it's because I've been reflecting recently on questions of culture and world view. Do I see the world purely from the perspective of being who I am? (A 55-year-old white Englishman who grew up in a small village in the 1970s.) If that's the case, is what I see an accurate representation of the whole of reality? Might other perspectives be possible? If I could see the world through the eyes of others, might my vision be richer, wider, deeper? Like a fish that suddenly realizes that seeing can happen not only through water, but through air as well? Seeing things from the perspective of others was something that Jesus did. An example of this happens when lesus heals a centurion's servant in Luke's Gospel (Luke 7: I-10). The centurion comes from a background and culture that's entirely different to that in which Jesus grew up. Yet Jesus is blown away by the insight that the centurion has about who Jesus himself is. This leads Jesus to exclaim "I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith!"
